

A PRELIMINARY CHECKLIST OF BUTTERFLIES OF PAIYUN RURAL MUNICIPALITY, PARBAT DISTRICT, NEPAL

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INTRODUCTION

Although the butterfly fauna of Nepal is reasonably well known (Smith, 1989; 1994; 2006; 2010; 2011), the butterfly fauna of the Parbat district is still undocumented. The present study comprises a 13 month opportunistic survey of the butterflies of Paiyun Rural Municipality, Parbat district.

STUDY AREA

Paiyun is a rural municipality (28°02'34"N; 83°39'59"E) situated in the southern part of Parbat district covering an area of 42.65 km². It is bordered by Syangja district to the east and to the south, Bihadi Rural Municipality to the west and Mahashila Rural Municipality of Parbat district to the north. The study was mostly carried out near the water bodies and meadows in the altitude range of 750 m. The dominant tree species of the area are *Schima wallichii* (Chilaune), *Castanopsis indica* (Katus), *Ficus lacor* (Kabthro), *Erythrina stricta* (Phaledo) and fodder species.

METHODOLOGY

The study was conducted opportunistically from March 2021 to March 2022 in

different places of Paiyun rural municipality. The survey was done randomly at all seasons of the year; Pre-monsoon, monsoon, post-monsoon, and winter. Bright and clear days were preferred for maximum observation of butterflies during study hours of 10:00 am to 4:00 pm. Most of the observations were made near the streams and small ponds. The butterflies were photographed with an android mobile phone. Specimens were not collected for this study. The photographed butterflies were identified using Smetacek (2016) and consultation with experts. Butterflies were classified according to their abundance in five categories, using the method of Kasambe *et al.* (2018), i.e.

A- Abundant: In most habitats, observed 80-90% of the time

C- Common: In most habitats, observed 60-80% of the time

U- Uncommon: In most habitats, observed 40-60% of the time

R- Rare: In most habitats, observed 20-40% of the time

VR- Very rare: In most habitats, observed less than 20% of the time

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

In this study a total of 158 butterfly species under 79 genera and six families were recorded (Table 1, Images 1-158). Nymphalidae species (n=67) were the dominant among the total butterflies observed, followed by Lycaenidae (n=27), Hesperidae (n=25), Pieridae (n=23), Papilionidae (n=13) and Riodinidae (n=3). The abundance of butterflies was as follows: Abundant (33 species), Common (35 species), Uncommon (32 species), Rare (31 species) and Very Rare (27 species).

The highest number of butterfly species were recorded between May to November in Paiyun. Single individuals of *Pachliopta aristolochiae* Common Rose, *Iambrix salsala* Chestnut Bob, *Abisara nephron* Tailed Judy, *Chilaria othana* Orchid Tit, *Liphyra brassolis* Moth Butterfly, *Euthalia monina* Powdered Baron and *Hestina persimilis* Siren were recorded on the stream banks. The greater variety of butterfly species maybe due to stream and waterholes available in the study area. It was observed that Nymphalid species are abundant in this area. Many researchers concluded the same result in different studies (Oli & Sharma, 2019; Khanal *et al.*, 2011; Bhusal & Khanal, 2008; Hamer *et al.*, 2005; Prajapati *et al.*, 2000).

SPECIAL RECORDS

1. *Liphyra brassolis* Westwood, 1864 (Image- 81): This extremely rare butterfly (KC, 2022) is distributed from Central Nepal to North-eastern India, Southeast Asia, Indonesia, the Philippines, New Guinea and the Solomon Islands to northern Australia (Samson & Smart, 1980; Smith, 2011). It has been recorded twice, in 1982 and after 39 years, a dead individual was found in Pokhara, Kaski in a dry forest stream (KC, 2022). Again, one living individual of *Liphyra brassolis* was

found on a bright, sunny day on a flower of *Tagetes erecta* Marigold at an elevation of 758m in Paiyun rural municipality, Parbat district.

2. *Hestina persimilis* (Westwood, [1850]) (Image- 121): This nymphalid is distributed through India (Himachal Pradesh to Arunachal Pradesh, northeast, Orissa), Nepal and Bhutan (Kehimkar, 2008). One individual of *Hestina persimilis* was found flying about bamboo and a home garden at an elevation of 760 m in Paiyun- 5, Parbat. It feeds on leaves of *Celtis australis*, a tree usually lopped for fodder, hence its rarity.

CONCLUSION

This study was conducted to collate a preliminary checklist of butterflies from Paiyun Rural Municipality, Parbat. Since there is no earlier study on species richness of butterflies in Parbat, this study provides an initial baseline for further study in other parts of the district. A total of 158 species of butterflies from six families were recorded. Nymphalidae was the most species-rich family (n=67). A living individual of the rare butterfly *Liphyra brassolis* was recorded after decades. Maximum species of butterflies were found near the aquatic resources. Because of the occurrence of rare and endemic species, Paiyun is likely to possess a rich and exceptional butterfly diversity. Regular observations and research are needed to update the checklist. Likewise, in depth research on host plants and behavioral studies are essential for effective understanding and conservation of these species.
